




# Imagine.


Some of our students tell us that the sound of pecan shells underfoot in our Pecan Court replicates the "delightful crunch" of snow - without the cold!



#### Student Residences

3. RANEY HALL (1958) houses 96 women. 4. VEASEY HALL (1967), known simply as "VZ," can accommodate 120 women.

**5. GALLOWAY HALL** (1933), a two-story Tudor-style building, houses 96 women.

**23. MARTIN HALL** (1919), a four-story residence hall, has space for 133 men.

**24. COUCH HALL** (1956) is Hendrix's only co-educational residence hall and can house 152 students.

**28. HARDIN HALL** (1964) can accommodate 142 male students.

**29. RESIDENCE HOUSES** (1999), known also as "The Quad," accommodate 16-18 residents in each of the six units.

**31. THE LANGUAGE HOUSE** (1939) provides a unique option for residents to immerse themselves in a foreign language, which changes each year.

#### **33. FRONT STREET APARTMENTS**

**36. THE HENDRIX CORNER** (2008) can house 72 students in 28 units consisting of two-bedroom townhouses and threebedroom flats.

**37. RESIDENCE APARTMENTS IN THE VILLAGE** (2009) can house up to 130 upperclassmen in two- and three-bedroom apartments.

**40. THE ECO HOUSE** provides co-ed housing with an emphasis on sustainable living.

#### Academic Buildings

2. BAILEY LIBRARY (1994) contains 193,000 book volumes; 34,000 bound periodical volumes; 32,000 government documents and an extensive collection of microfilms. The building also houses the Snoddy Academic Resources Center, which includes the general student computer lab, the Library Media Center, the writing lab, and a 24-hour study area. **6. THE RANEY BUILDING** (1968) houses the departments of philosophy and religion.

**13. MILLS CENTER FOR SOCIAL SCIENCES** (1975) houses the departments of economics and business, education, history, politics, and sociology.

14. & 15. CHARLES D. MORGAN CENTER FOR PHYSICAL SCIENCES (2000) includes REYNOLDS HALL (1931) and ACXIOM HALL (2000) and houses chemistry, computer science, mathematics and physics, and also includes many specialized labs and facilities for student and faculty research.

#### **16. THE BERTIE WILSON MURPHY**

**BUILDING** (2002) serves as the center for programs in language and literature (such as readings and film series) sponsored by the Hendrix-Murphy Foundation.

#### 22. DONALD W. REYNOLDS CENTER FOR

LIFE SCIENCES (2001) houses the departments of biology and psychology and provides generous lab and research space for students and faculty.

#### 25. TRIESCHMANN FINE ARTS BUILDING

**AND REVES RECITAL HALL** (1962) provide resources for the department of music. Trieschmann also houses a gallery and a dance studio. Reves Recital Hall is used for student and faculty musical recitals.

**34. THE ART COMPLEX** (2003) includes three buildings with a large gallery, spacious studios for drawing, painting, printmaking, sculpture and ceramics, and a photography studio and darkrooms.

**CENTER** (2010) houses Student Affairs, Career Services, Religious Life, Residence Life, the Odyssey program, Academic Support Services, and the Volunteer Action Center. It also includes an Educational Technology Center, performance spaces, offices for student organizations, a dining hall with a cathedral ceiling, the post office, a game area, and a café.

#### Athletic Facilities

7. WELLNESS AND ATHLETICS CENTER (2007) includes an aquatics center with retracting roof, competition and recreational gymnasiums, climbing wall, fitness center, sand volleyball court, and space for dance and aerobics.

**17. THE BOOKSTORE,** located on the first floor of Building D in the Residence Apartments in The Village, is the College's one-stop shop for books, supplies, and Hendrix apparel and gifts.

(1977) contains a 224-seat, thrust-stage theater that is used for Hendrix Players mainstage productions and studentdirected one-act plays.

#### How to get here

BY CAR: Traveling west on I-40, take Exit 125 and turn left onto US 65-B/Harkrider St. Traveling east on I-40, take Exit 125 and turn right onto US 65-B/Harkrider St. Stav on US 65-B/Harkrider St. for about half a mile. Travel past The Village at Hendrix on your left, through the first roundabout (exiting to remain on US 65-B/Harkrider St.), and underneath a pedestrian bridge. Upon entering the second roundabout, take an immediate right onto Markham St., and then take the first right onto Spruce St. From Spruce St., turn right at the Visitor Parking sign. You will find visitor parking in front of Ellis Hall, home of the Hendrix Office of Admission and Financial Aid.

BY PLANE: Little Rock National Airport is served by American Eagle, Continental Express, Delta/Delta Connection, Southwest, United Express, and US Airways Express airlines. It is approximately a 30-minute drive from the Hendrix campus. If a student is flying alone, notify us ahead of time when your flight will be arriving and a Hendrix student will meet you at the airport and drive you to campus. Rental cars are also available from most national agencies.

If you drive yourself from the airport, take I-440 West (toward Little Rock). Take the I-30 East exit, and proceed on I-30 East to I-40. From the far left lane of I-30 East, merge onto I-40 West. (Then follow the "By Car" directions above.)



**BY TRAIN:** Amtrak's Texas Eagle (800-872-7245) provides passenger service with scheduled arrivals and departures at Little Rock's beautifully restored Union Station Square.
